Welcome to 'We Move, Perseverance Under the Pandemic', a student led conference, hosted by the Centre of Applied Sociology. Students will present a diverse range of engaging papers through individual papers, posters and two way discussions. These focus on their identities, and how they have navigated them throughout their lives, but specifically during these difficult times. In 2009 Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie gave a wonderful Ted Talk, entitled 'The Danger of a Single Story' which makes many valid points about why although we may belong to one group, our identities, stories and experiences are not monolithic. However, I adapt this saying by recognising that the students' papers demonstrate how the story of one can be that of many. This is because the individual stories shared will resonate with other students and people more broadly.

In terms of the structure of the conference, this is an online event. Registration begins at 9.45am, and there will be a joint keynote speech by Professor Tracey Reynolds (University of Greenwich) and Professor Gayle Letherby (Plymouth University).
